

Jesus Paul And The Law

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It is widely recognized that there is a large conceptual leap between Jesus (as presented in the Gospels) and Paul. Jesus lived as a Jew, in obedience to the Law of Moses, and he restricted his mission to "the lost sheep of the house of Israel" (Mt. 15:24). Paul devoted himself primarily to the conversion of Gentiles.

Jesus ministered under the Mosaic Law. Paul made it clear that the Church is not under the Law (Romans 6.14) and that that one cannot live a victorious Christian life under the Law. Paul taught that one lives the Christian life by faith, under grace, by the power of the Holy Spirit. The Mosaic Law knew nothing of this.

Understanding "Paul and the law" is critical to the study of the New Testament, because it touches on the perennial question of the relationship between the grace of God in the gift of salvation and the demand of God in the call for holy living. Misunderstanding can lead to distortions of one or both.

We, according to Paul, died to the law, meaning that its ability to identify us as sinners and demand our life in payment for our sins was fulfilled through the sacrifice of Jesus.

What did Paul teach about God's law?

Part of the reason some believe the apostle Paul changed what Jesus taught is the perception that Paul's teaching on grace means that obeying God's law is no longer required. Did Paul Contradict Christ About Abolishing the Law?

The apostle Paul wrote, "For Christ is the end of the law for righteousness to everyone who believes" (Romans 10:4). Many assume this means Jesus Christ did away with the law. But that interpretation is in direct contradiction to Jesus' own words: "Do not think that I came to destroy the Law or the Prophets.

Second, Paul's devotion to the Law would have provided him motivation to be present in Jerusalem during Passover—a time where both he and Jesus would have been in close proximity. Third, as a Pharisee, Paul would have been keenly interested in the teaching of a popular, if unconventional, rabbi.

There are some who argue that, since Jesus did not "abolish" the Law, then the Law is still in effect—and still binding on New Testament Christians. But Paul is clear that the believer in Christ is no longer under the Law: "We were held in custody under the Law, locked up until faith should be revealed.
